1 THE CLERK: Sykes, line 19.
2 THE COURT: Let's get your names.
3 MR. WALLER: Harvey Waller for the petitioner.
4 THE COURT: The petitioner is connected or
5 related how?
6 MR. WALLER: Daughter.
7 THE COURT: Thank you.
8 Your name?
9 MS. THORPE: Carolyn Thorpe, daughter.
10 THE COURT: Sir?
11 MR. THORPE: Fred Thorpe, son-in-law.
12 MR. COHEN: Ira Jay Cohen, and I filed an
13 appearance; and you have it on behalf of
14 Mrs. Sykes' daughter, Gloria Jean.
15 I would like to point out, your
16 Honor, that members --
17 THE COURT: I want everyone up here, who is
18 here on this case. Is Mary Sykes here today?
19 MR. WALLER: No, she is not. I would like a
20 second to talk about that.
21 THE COURT: One moment, please.
22 MR. WALLER: Sure.
23 THE COURT: I want a second to get these folks
24 on the record and find out what the deal is here.

1 How many children are there altogether?

2 MR. WALLER: Two.

3 THE COURT: The spouse is? Is there a spouse?

4 MR. WALLER: Deceased.

5 MS. THORPE: Deceased.

6 THE COURT: Let's get everyone up here now.

7 All right. Come on up a little

8 closer I will not bite anyone. Tell me your name?

9 MS. Y. BAKKEN: Yolanda Bakken, B-a-k-k-e-n.

10 THE COURT: How do you know Mary?

11 MS. Y. BAKKEN: Sister.

12 THE COURT: Thank you. Are you older or

13 younger?

14 MS. Y. BAKKEN: I am ten years younger.

15 THE COURT: Ma'am?

16 MS. BAKKEN: Kathy Bakken, spelled the same;

17 and Yolanda is my mom.

18 THE COURT: You are a niece.

19 MS. DE PIETO: Josephine De Pieto.

20 THE COURT: How do you know Mary?

21 MS. DE PIETO: Sister.

22 THE COURT: Are you feeling okay?

23 MS. DE PIETO: Yes.

24 THE COURT: Sorry you had to wait so long.

1 Sir?

2 MR. EVANS: Scott Evans.

3 THE COURT: How are you connected?

4 MR. EVANS: Friend of the Sykes.

5 THE COURT: Are you a friend of Mary?

6 MR. EVANS: Yes, and I know -- I have known the
7 family for 13 or 14 years.

8 THE COURT: Ma'am?

9 MS. COFFMAN: Corrine Coffman.

10 THE COURT: Can you spell that?

11 MS. COFFMAN: C-o-f-f-m-a-n.

12 THE COURT: How do you know Mary?

13 MS. COFFMAN: Through Yolanda, and a family
14 friend for years and years.

15 THE COURT: How long would you say?

16 MS. COFFMAN: Ten or 20, or 15 or 20 years I
17 have known Mary.

18 THE COURT: She is the one I want to key in on.
19 Ma'am your name?

20 MS. EVANS: Doris Evans.

21 THE COURT: How do you know her?

22 MS. EVANS: Since 1995.

23 THE COURT: Are you a neighbor?

24 MS. EVANS: A neighbor of her daughters.

1 THE COURT: Somebody tell me where Miss Mary
2 Sykes is right now.

3 MR. WALLER: I think she is staying at her
4 daughter's house in Naperville.

5 MS. THORPE: Yes.

6 THE COURT: Who else is in your home with you?

7 MS. THORPE: Our 22 year old daughter, Kristin.

8 THE COURT: Does mom have her own room at this
9 point?

10 MS. THORPE: Yes.

11 THE COURT: Is she taking medication?

12 MS. THORPE: Yes, blood pressure medication
13 once a day and Exelon Patch once a day.

14 THE COURT: She seems to take those without any
15 problem?

16 MS. THORPE: Yes, we have a routine for her
17 every morning.

18 THE COURT: Does your sister visit with mother?

19 MR. WALLER: She lives -- Mary lives in
20 Chicago.

21 THE COURT: I thought she was living with you?

22 MR. WALLER: Just temporarily.

23 THE COURT: I am talking about what is going on
24 right now. How long is she with you?

1 MS. THORPE: We left on vacation June 30th to
2 visit our daughter in Pennsylvania.

3 And at that time our sister said she
4 was traveling; and we were going to keep her
5 through the end of July. My sister, I believe,
6 left sometime the end of July, beginning of August.
7 So mom stayed with us.

8 THE COURT: Okay.

9 MS. THORPE: And we made plans for the end of
10 August because we didn't know when my sister would
11 be returning. The goal right now is to have mom go
12 back this weekend to 6014 North Avondale in
13 Chicago.

14 THE COURT: Has that been discussed?

15 MR. COHEN: May I supplement that?

16 THE COURT: Yes.

17 MR. COHEN: Your Honor, in early June
18 Mrs. Sykes, Mary Sykes, brought a pro se order of
19 protection against her daughter Carol.

20 Gloria has been living -- it is a
21 two-flat -- with her for about ten years. There
22 was a house behind. There were problems with mold,
23 it is uninhabitable. That was five years ago.

24 And she moved into the -- moved into

1 the two-flat, and some disputes arose between the
2 two sisters and Mary Sykes over her trying to
3 change her will.

4 Miss Sykes brought a pro se petition
5 for an order of protection. It was in Chicago. It
6 was a probate matter, and it was entered and
7 continued to June 30th. So that is for status.

8 On June 30th, when I was not
9 representing anyone at that point, but Gloria Sykes
10 told me this, she was leaving with her mother, and
11 Miss Sykes was ejected.

12 THE COURT: Leaving with her mother?

13 MR. COHEN: From the courtroom.

14 THE COURT: Okay.

15 MR. COHEN: And the deputies told her to stand
16 back, and she was ejected. They were both pro se.
17 She was ejected from the courtroom.

18 THE COURT: Was there a court order?

19 MR. COHEN: Entered and continued to June 21st
20 for status regarding the OP.

21 THE COURT: What happened then?

22 MR. COHEN: Since June 30th she was living with
23 her sister Carol. Now, the family has had trouble,
24 difficulty seeing and talking to the mom. The --



1 THE COURT: Let's get back to the order of
2 protection. Is there any other order entered?

3 MR. WALLER: It was consolidated.

4 MR. COHEN: I was speaking.

5 THE COURT: Let him finish.

6 MR. COHEN: It was consolidated, and it is
7 supposed to expire today. I have a copy of the
8 consolidation order.

9 THE COURT: Did my Guardian Ad Litem go out and
10 visit with her?

11 MR. COHEN: She sent you a fax, and I don't
12 think you have seen it. She has not visited with
13 her.

14 MR. WALLER: Set up for next week.

15 THE COURT: Do we have a doctor's report?

16 MR. COHEN: No.

17 THE COURT: How do we know she has been
18 diagnosed with dementia?

19 MR. WALLER: Your Honor, if I may.

20 THE COURT: Has she been diagnosed with
21 dementia?

22 MR. WALLER: She has been brought to the
23 general family physician, who wanted her referred
24 out.

1 The daughters brought her to a
2 psychologist, and that indicates -- the
3 psychologist indicates that there is a great
4 likelihood she has dementia.

5 Okay, we have the report here. Let
6 me see it.

7 MR. COHEN: The family doctor issued a letter
8 and sent it to Miss Thorpe saying he couldn't fill
9 out the CCP-211.

10 THE COURT: Okay.

11 MR. COHEN: Because he had met with her twice,
12 Mary Sykes, and he said he would talk to her. She
13 gave him a straight answer, and what would happen
14 is a few minutes later she might forget what he had
15 said, but he refused to fill out the CCP-211.

16 THE COURT: Did you see this report here?

17 MR. COHEN: On the guardianship?

18 THE COURT: From Motika (Phonetic)?

19 MR. COHEN: That is the first time I saw it.
20 That is by a clinical psychologist.

21 THE COURT: She falls within the severely
22 impaired.

23 MR. COHEN: His conclusions are guardianship
24 should be considered.

1 MR. COHEN: I don't know this fellow from
2 Adam's office.

3 THE COURT: But he gives a petition that there
4 is a need for guardianship. Do you dispute that
5 there is a need for guardianship?

6 MR. COHEN: My client believes that her mother
7 is capable of taking care of herself. She would
8 like the guardian to meet with her.

9 She was in the process of trying to
10 change her estate plan. These people have known
11 her, and I frankly don't know --

12 THE COURT: What estate plan is in effect right
13 now?

14 MR. WALLER: If I can go back, as far as the
15 protection order.

16 THE COURT: Yes.

17 MR. WALLER: Mary allegedly walked in and tried
18 to do this ex-parte, and the judge wouldn't do it.

19 THE COURT: Mary tried to get her own order of
20 protection?

21 MR. WALLER: Yes, and the judge wouldn't rule
22 because it is ex-parte.

23 THE COURT: There are ex-parte orders.

24 MR. WALLER: That is how my client got

1 notified, and she kicked it over here for
2 guardianship.

3 MR. WALLER: Mary executed documents in 1995.

4 MS. THORPE: 2005.

5 MR. WALLER: 2005, excuse me. That is what
6 allegedly is trying to be changed.

7 My understanding is there was a
8 family attorney that refused to do it sometime this
9 year, is that correct?

10 MS. THORPE: Yes.

11 THE COURT: What was executed in 2005, what
12 documents?

13 MR. WALLER: I have a power of attorney for
14 property. I have to pull out my documents. I
15 believe a will.

16 THE COURT: One at a time.

17 MR. WALLER: I am speaking.

18 THE COURT: POA for property, a will, and what
19 else?

20 MR. WALLER: I think a health care. A POA on
21 health care, and a trust, all of which we have
22 copies of.

23 THE COURT: All right. Hold on for a second.
24 Do you have copies of all the documents?

1 MR. COHEN: I have seen them, judge.

2 THE COURT: Who is given the authority under
3 the POA?

4 MR. COHEN: There is a question because there
5 was a POA for health care, but in -- I believe it
6 was June 25th, Miss Sykes, Mary Sykes, went over to
7 legal services.

8 THE COURT: June 25th of this year?

9 MR. COHEN: Yes, there was a subsequent POA.

10 THE COURT: Who was the agency under the 2005
11 document? Whose signature?

12 MR. WALLER: My client Carol.

13 THE COURT: She went to make some changes in
14 June '09 and what happened?

15 MR. COHEN: Yes, she went to the Chicago Legal
16 Services on June 25th, and she met with Mr. Littman
17 separately and alone, and she had a 45 minute to
18 one hour in-take with him.

19 THE COURT: Is there a new document?

20 MR. COHEN: On the 30th she went to court, and
21 since then she has been with her sister. And they
22 have called Mrs. Sykes' daughter asking where they
23 could find her because they have --

24 THE COURT: I want to know about new documents.

1 MR. COHEN: We don't know.

2 MR. WALLER: We have not executed or brought
3 her to any attorney, and I have not executed any.
4 The only thing I have are signed copies of the
5 original documents, and I tendered them to
6 different counsel.

7 MR. COHEN: You didn't give them to me.

8 MR. WALLER: And the protection order.

9 THE COURT: Make sure whatever documents you
10 have, you will forward them.

11 MR. COHEN: I have seen them. Mrs. Sykes
12 obtained them in the middle of May. She went to
13 Mr. Hagerty's office.

14 THE COURT: Whose that?

15 MR. WALLER: The family attorney.

16 MR. COHEN: She requested her file, and he
17 refused to give them to her, and she subsequently
18 sent a letter and she subsequently had another
19 attorney talk to him. And she went over and she
20 picked up her estate plan, and that was in the
21 first week of June.

22 THE COURT: The estate plan documents are in
23 place?

24 MR. WALLER: Yes.

1 THE COURT: There is no one that knows of any
2 changes that are in place.

3 UNIDENTIFIED PERSON: My mother went in and
4 spoke to Mr. Littman (Phonetic) on her own.

5 THE COURT: Were there any documents she
6 signed?

7 UNIDENTIFIED PERSON: She was unable to because
8 my sister took her from the court.

9 THE COURT: What is the new document?

10 MR. COHEN: That is what I was getting to, the
11 POA for health care.

12 Mr. Littman (Phonetic) gave
13 Mrs. Sykes a POA for health care, and she hand
14 wrote it out. And she had it witnessed by two
15 independent notaries and witnessed and it changes
16 the agent.

17 THE COURT: Where is it?

18 MR. WALLER: I have a copy.

19 THE COURT: Whose the agent?

20 MR. COHEN: Gloria and Carol is the successor
21 agent.

22 THE COURT: Okay, conflicting POA's. Very
23 good, make sure the Guardian Ad Litem -- there are
24 the two different POA's, all right.

1 MR. WALLER: Sure.

2 THE COURT: You have agreed to return mother to
3 her home, is that correct?

4 MS. THORPE: We have a meeting next Wednesday
5 or Friday with Miss Faranga. She wants to speak
6 with me also.

7 THE COURT: Where is that meeting going to take
8 place?

9 MS. THORPE: At her Evanston office.

10 THE COURT: Mother will be returning home after
11 that?

12 MS. THORPE: Yes.

13 THE COURT: Madam, what did you want to say?

14 MS. COFFMAN: This is the fifth time we have
15 heard her say she is bringing her home.

16 THE COURT: She just told me in open court.
17 Take a breathe, madam. Did you refuse to let
18 people communicate?

19 MS. COFFMAN: No.

20 MS. THORPE: No.

21 THE COURT: Her sisters intended to visit her.

22 MS. THORPE: My Aunt Jo spent from 11 o'clock
23 to 7:30, and my Aunt Yolanda and Kathy came.

24 THE COURT: And at this time, is there a

1 problem?

2 MS. THORPE: Saturday they were going to visit
3 with my Aunt Jo, and I called her about quarter to
4 11 to tell her we were coming because of the broken
5 wrist. She slept and didn't get the phone calls.
6 And she called and spoke to my husband and said you
7 know I slept through the phone calls, and I am very
8 sorry the visit didn't take place.

9 THE COURT: What is your visit issue with the
10 visits have you visited with your sister?

11 MS. BAKKEN: We walked in, and she didn't
12 expect us.

13 THE COURT: Did she say get out, you can't come
14 in?

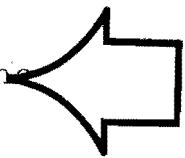
15 MS. Y. BAKKEN: No.

16 THE COURT: How many times have you seen your
17 sister since she has been out at her sister's
18 house?

19 MS. Y. BAKKEN: Twice.

20 THE COURT: Is that because that was your
21 choice or did you want to go other times?

22 MS. Y. BAKKEN: I am close to my sister. She
23 is 90 and I am 80. We communicate every two to
24 three days.



1 THE COURT: Did you try to call her at her
2 house?

3 MS. Y. BAKKEN: Yes, and I never got an answer.

4 THE COURT: No one picked it up? No one picked
5 it up?

6 MS. BAKKEN: Occasionally.

7 THE COURT: Were there phone calls not
8 answered?

9 MS. THORPE: Numerous, and past ten o'clock, I
10 am usually in bed.

11 THE COURT: One at a time.

12 MS. THORPE: And my communication with the
13 Chicago Police Department, the 16th District, was
14 because I was concerned about the phone calls
15 coming in late. And they told me I was to tell my
16 sister and my aunt that one phone call per day
17 while they have been calling.

18 The last few times that my aunt does
19 call and when my sister calls it usually turns into
20 a challenge. An issue where --

21 THE COURT: Is there any reason why your mother
22 can't move back home?

23 MS. THORPE: We have plans to go to friends in
24 Fox Lake and then the plans for next week,

1 Wednesday, to have her speak with the Guardian Ad
2 Litem, which was hopefully going to have been done
3 this week, but she went out of town.

4 MR. WALLER: Mrs. Faranga went out of town.
5 They are set up for next Tuesday or Wednesday.

6 MR. COHEN: My client can take her mother to
7 the guardian's office just as well as her sister
8 and sit there outside or one of the two sisters or
9 the niece. There is no reason that this woman
10 shouldn't come home.

11 THE COURT: Mr. Stern. How is Naperville?

12 MS. THORPE: Beautiful.

13 THE COURT: Can you visit with her?

14 MR. STERN: Yes.

15 THE COURT: Come back Monday or Tuesday. This
16 woman wants to get out and move back to her home,
17 and we need to get that effectuated. Madam?

18 MS. G. SYKES: Every time my mother, I talk to
19 her, she says I want to come home, and come pick me
20 up.

21 And my sister will take the phone
22 away, and my sister will be in the background. I
23 have to get permission from my sister, and my
24 sister said she didn't know I was going out of

1 town. She not only knew I was going out of town
2 and she knew my mother was coming with me and
3 wouldn't allow it.

4 THE COURT: What kind of medication is she on.

5 MS. G. SYKES: Blood pressure and memory patch.

6 THE COURT: Whose her doctor?

7 MS. THORPE: Doctor Patel.

8 MS. G. SYKES: For 11 years I was with my
9 mother.

10 THE COURT: Why the memory patch?

11 MS. G. SYKES: She was on a medication for a
12 while the blood pressure that we ultimately figured
13 out was the cause of memory loss. And I recently
14 in January brought her to the doctor, and he agreed
15 to switch her over to another.

16 THE COURT: He she does have memory loss.

17 MS. G. SYKES: I'll tell you something.

18 THE COURT: If your mother was fully in, if she
19 had cancer you would let her make her decisions
20 right by herself.

21 MS. G. SYKES: Before she left on the 30.

22 THE COURT: I am asking you the question.

23 MS. G. SYKES: Yes.

24 THE COURT: There is no need to have a

1 guardian.

2 MS. G. SYKES: I don't --

3 MR. WALLER: Your Honor, if I may.

4 MR. COHEN: The primary physician didn't think
5 so as of June 15th.

6 MR. WALLER: Mary Sykes lived in the same house
7 on Avondale for years. In the summertime that my
8 client was at home, vacation time, they don't like
9 it.

10 MS. G. SYKES: First time in 11 years.

11 MR. WALLER: Somebody takes her. To try and
12 change the family attorney to change the estate
13 plan. if you know what is going on after --

14 MS. BAKKEN: For years, that is part of what is
15 going on.

16 MR. COHEN: That is not the case.

17 THE COURT: Spend a little time. Don't have
18 the first question out of your mother, where do you
19 want to go? Does she want to go to Fox Lake with
20 her daughter?

21 MR. WALLER: Can your Honor order that the will
22 and everything not be changed?

23 THE COURT: There will be no changing of any
24 will or POA and estate planning. Everyone is on

1 notice. Don't do that while this is pending.

2 MS. COFFMAN: I went with Yolanda and since all
3 this trouble has been brewing, I have eavesdropped
4 on the phone, and Carol has specifically told
5 Yolanda that you will not see your sister until she
6 is dead.

7 MR. WALLER: Your Honor, where are he we going
8 with this?

9 THE COURT: These are allegations only.

10 MR. WALLER: There are 8 people here. We are
11 out numbered.

12 THE COURT: There are strong feelings here.

13 MS. G. SYKES: My sister said I would never see
14 her again.

15 THE COURT: If when you talk to her, whatever
16 she wants to do. If she wants to stay with her
17 daughter until the end of next week, there will be
18 full, open visitation. Do you understand that?

19 MS. THORPE: Yes.

20 THE COURT: There is no cutting off the phone
21 calls.

22 Whoever calls can talk to her,
23 although you can set up time frames. Please call
24 between 10 and 2. They can have reasonable access;

1 and if they want to come and visit, they can visit
2 her.

3 MS. THORPE: As long as they come and ask me
4 and not just come and bang on the door.

5 THE COURT: Set up times and dates.

6 MS. THORPE: Yes.

7 MS. COFFMAN: I went to the dentist yesterday,
8 and it is close by her home. And my daughter was
9 with me, and she said let's stop and see if we can
10 go to Aunty Mary's home. Because she says she
11 takes her here and there, and that is not the
12 truth. She doesn't really take my sister anywhere.
13 If she said I banged on the door, how would you
14 know? Were you in the house and wouldn't answer
15 the door?

16 THE COURT: Just address the court.

17 MS. COFFMAN: She tends to exaggerate things.

18 THE COURT: Okay.

19 MS. COFFMAN: When I talk to my sister on the
20 phone, I don't like somebody to eavesdrop on my
21 conversation. At our ages we don't need somebody
22 to overhear --

23 THE COURT: Your friend was on the phone as
24 well?

1 MS. COFFMAN: She doesn't want anybody
2 unannounced coming to the home.

3 THE COURT: We will set up days and times for
4 visitation. The end of next week?

5 MR. STERN: Yes.

6 MS. G. SYKES: May I say one more thing?

7 THE COURT: Yes.

8 MS. G. SYKES: My mother has lived in her home
9 fifty years on September 29th. She has been able
10 to have her family over. She has been able to talk
11 on the phone whenever she wants, and she has been
12 able to make any decisions she wants.

13 I have letters from neighbors and
14 people from anybody who knows my mother and have
15 been part of her life. I went over there, and I
16 got permission.

17 THE COURT: I am sending out a special person
18 to talk to your mom. If she wants to go home
19 before next week, we will get her home.

20 MR. WALLER: One more comment.

21 THE COURT: Yes.

22 MR. WALLER: Catholic Charities has been
23 intimately involved in this matter. As a matter
24 fact --

1 THE COURT: Who is the person?
2 MS. THORPE: Betty McLaren (Phonetic).
3 THE COURT: Do you have her number?
4 MS. THORPE: Yes.
5 THE COURT: Call her.
6 MR. WALLER: Yes, and who is the other lady?
7 THE COURT: One at a time, folks.
8 MR. WALLER: We have somebody from Elder Abuse,
9 is that correct or the City of Chicago?
10 MS. THORPE: The Department of Aging through
11 Cook County was involved. Patty Porter was the
12 original social worker.
13 THE COURT: Get the names of those persons to
14 Mr. Stern and phone numbers.
15 MR. WALLER: They want to testify at the order
16 of protection. There is a long record here.
17 THE COURT: I don't even have the open file.
18 MR. COHEN: There is a long history.
19 THE COURT: She has agreed mother will go home,
20 if she is in distress, and we will hear from you
21 Monday.
22 MR. STERN: No problem.
23 THE COURT: Yes.
24 MR. COHEN: August 31st, what time is that what

1 you are saying.

2 THE COURT: Yes.

3 MR. COHEN: Can I check my calendar?

4 THE COURT: Yes. Off the record. .

5 (Discussion held off the record.)

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
